Established in 2012, the European Liberal Arts Network (ELAN) is a network of 12 leading European Universities designed to promote and develop a Liberal Arts approach to Higher Education. The aim of the Network is to stimulate a more systematic interdisciplinary and international exchange of knowledge and prepare students to navigate complexity, diversity, and change effectively.

UNLOCKING OPPORTUNITIES

By fulfilling specific requirements, including a research project on a Liberal Arts topic, students can earn the valuable ELAN Certificate. This certificate not only distinguishes students from other mobility participants but also demonstrates their readiness for global challenges and highlights their commitment to contributing positively to society.

ELAN CERTIFICATE

The ELAN certificate is the chief instrument by which the Network promotes and disseminates the ideals of a Liberal Arts education. It makes an attractive supplement to students' academic transcripts, attesting their versatility, enterprise and social responsibility, and enhancing their employment prospects.

Step by Step Guide



Allocation by Home University

You must register your interest to go on an ELAN exchange with your home university, who are responsible for provisionally allocating you to a partner university.



Prepare Supporting Documents

Start preparing your supporting documents for your ELAN application. This includes requesting your transcript and exploring units you might want to study etc. The most recent fact sheets can be found on the ELAN website.



Application to ELAN Network

Submit the required documents to the ELAN Coordinator at your home university by the ELAN deadline. Your ELAN Coordinator will confirm the deadline with you.

ELAN Application Outcome

The ELAN coordinator at your Home University will let you know if you have successfully secured a place to study at one of your chosen ELAN destinations and next steps.



Exchange Application to Host University

Once you have been accepted via the ELAN Network, your home university will nominate you and you must submit an exchange application directly to your host university.

Exchange Application Acceptance & Next Steps

If you submitted your exchange application correctly and by the deadline, your host university will send you an acceptance letter and information on next steps.

Predeparture and Preparing for Arrival

Your host university will send you information on key predeparture steps such as unit registration, orientation events, accommodation and visas (if applicable).

Arrival – Meet your Host ELAN Coordinator

Your host ELAN coordinator will arrange a time to meet you in the first weeks of term to say 'hi!' and help with any questions you may have about starting your studies.

ELAN Certificate

If you want to apply for the ELAN certificate, you must inform your home ELAN coordinator and consult with them about the fulfilment of the requirements.

Sadly, it's now time to say goodbye! Your home ELAN coordinator will verify your ELAN certificate requirements (if applicable) and you will be sent your certificate directly.

ELAN APPLICATION PROCEDURE

Overview of ELAN Application

Students interested in participating in an exchange mobility through the European Liberal Arts Network (ELAN) must follow a two-step application process:

1. Apply to ELAN:

Before applying to your chosen host university, you must first submit an application via the ELAN network. This programme is for highly motivated and exceptional students who wish to study at one of the select universities within the ELAN network, which specialises in Liberal Arts. Entry is competitive, with limited places available, so it is important to submit a strong application.

Documents required for the ELAN Application:



Please note: The ELAN Coordinator at your **home university** will provide you with the ELAN application form and submission deadline. If the host university you have chosen requires any additional documents, they will request these from you directly.

2. Apply to your Host University:

Once you have been accepted by the ELAN network, you can proceed with your application to the central exchange office at your chosen host university. This step can only be completed after you've been selected by ELAN. Your host university will then contact you with next steps.

Top Tips for your Application

Be Specific and Focused:

In your application, clearly explain why you want to join the ELAN programme and how your chosen universities align with your academic interests. We strongly encourage you to give careful consideration to your project proposal.

Do Your Research:

Show that you've researched the host universities, their courses, and research opportunities.

Mention specific units, professors, or resources that attract you to your chosen university, and explain how they fit into your academic and career plans.

Keep It Clear and Well-Structured:

Write in a clear and focused manner and avoid unnecessary details. Ensure your documents are well-organised and easy to navigate. Proofread carefully to highlight your strengths and demonstrate why you are a strong candidate for the ELAN programme.

ELAN brings together twelve European universities with experience in Liberal Arts and/or a strong focus on interdisciplinary research and teaching in the Arts and Humanities.

Students are strongly encouraged to engage with non-academic partners, including government and nongovernment organisations, businesses, charities, or cultural institutions such as museums and galleries.

CHARLES UNIVERSITY

Prague, Czech Republic

The Faculty of Arts is one of the original four faculties of Charles University, established in 1348 alongside the Faculties of Theology, Law, and Medicine. It currently offers 89 fields of study across 45 departments and institutes, making it one of the largest and most significant humanities institutions in the Czech Republic. The faculty occupies several buildings in the city center of Prague, with its main building located at Jan Palach Square.

ELAN students can choose from the courses offered by any of the departments at the Faculty of Arts, with many courses taught fully in English. In addition to the subject areas listed below, students can also take language and literature classes in Czech, English, French, German, Spanish, Italian, Russian, and other languages. Courses are available at the BA, MA, and PhD levels.

ECOLE NORMALE SUPÉRIEURE - PS

Paris, France

Founded in 1794 during the French Revolution, the École Normale Supérieure – PSL is today both a French grande école and a full member of Paris Sciences et Lettres University. It offers postgraduate and doctoral programmes, as well as top-level research centres that continue to exemplify academic excellence, producing prize-winners and scholars of international renown.

Located in the heart of the Latin Quarter, the ENS-PSL offers intellectual freedom, multidisciplinary approaches in the humanities and sciences, individual attention to students, and a vibrant campus life. For more than two centuries, the ENS-PSL has prepared its students for the most diverse careers and the highest responsibilities, while remaining deeply engaged in the intellectual, scientific, and cultural debates of its time particularly through the many contributions of the normaliens.

HEIDELBERG UNIVERSITY

Heidelberg, Germany

Founded in 1386, Heidelberg University is Germany's oldest and one of Europe's most research-intensive institutions. With 30,000 students, including over 5,000 internationals from 130 countries, it is deeply engaged in European research and mobility programs. The university participates in networks like the Coimbra Group and LERU and has exchange agreements with 400 universities worldwide, reflecting its strong global focus.

Heidelberg has a long tradition of international cooperation, offering excellent support for inbound students, including German language programmes and extracurricular activities for smooth integration. The university's interdisciplinary approach aligns with its overall educational philosophy of fostering global connections and intercultural experiences.

KU LEUVEN

Leuven, Belgium

KU Leuven, founded in 1425, is Belgium's largest and highest-ranked university, currently ranked 43rd in the world (THE World University Rankings 2025). It is home to 15 faculties offering hundreds of degree programmes. KU Leuven's main campus is located in Leuven, approximately 30 kilometres from Brussels, the capital of Belgium and Europe.

The Faculty of Arts is situated in the city centre of Leuven, within walking distance of the railway station and the main university buildings. It also has campuses in Brussels, Antwerp, and Kortrijk. The Faculty offers 9 BA and 20 MA programmes in fields such as linguistics, literary studies, Japanese and Korean studies, Arabic and Islamic studies, Chinese studies, applied foreign languages, archaeology, art history, musicology, and history. All BA programmes are conducted in Dutch, but numerous courses are available in English and other languages. Additionally, the Faculty offers 7 international MA programmes in literary studies, linguistics, European studies, cultural studies, and history.

TRINITY COLLEGE DUBLIN

Dublin, Ireland

Trinity College Dublin, the University of Dublin, is located in the heart of Dublin, Ireland's vibrant capital city. Ireland's oldest and leading university, it was founded in 1592 by Queen Elizabeth I and has a rich tradition of scholarship spanning over four centuries. Its historic campus attracts visitors worldwide to see the renowned Long Room Library, the famous Book of Kells, and the beautiful campanile and Georgian squares.

Trinity's 47-acre campus is at the centre of everything Dublin offers. The city blends a high-energy, multinational professional culture with traditional Irish warmth, featuring sprawling parks, historic sites, museums, galleries, cozy cafés, quirky restaurants for the daytime, and lively pubs, music gigs, and theatre by night. UNIVERSITY COLLEGE UTRE

Utrecht, Netherlands

Founded in 1998 as the first university college in the Netherlands, University College Utrecht (UCU) is an internationally recognised institution offering an English-language undergraduate Liberal Arts & Sciences programme. With around 750 students from nearly 70 nationalities, UCU allows students to tailor their curriculum from over 200 courses in humanities, science, and social sciences, with support from personal tutors.

Situated on a historic campus in Utrecht, UCU fosters a close-knit, intellectually vibrant community. The integrated campus, where students live and study in close proximity, enhances both academic and social experiences. UCU welcomes around 100 exchange students annually, contributing to its diverse, international atmosphere and encouraging cross-disciplinary engagement.

UNIVERSITY OF COIMBRA

Coimbra, Portugal

The University of Coimbra (UC) is a Portuguese public higher education institution with over 700 years of experience in education, training, and research, with the oldest part of the campus dating back to the 16th century. In 2013, the university and its medieval surroundings were classified as a World Heritage site by UNESCO. Coimbra, a district capital, is primarily a university city with around 150,000 inhabitants. Located in central Portugal, it is close to both the mountains and the sea, nestled between Serra da Lousã (part of the European network of protected natural areas) and Serra da Estrela (the highest mountain in mainland Portugal), and less than an hour from the coastline.

The University of Coimbra offers a variety of courses for students visiting through the ELAN network that foster collaboration across different fields, as well as language courses in Portuguese, Spanish, English, French, German, Italian, Dutch, and Russian.

UNIVERSITY OF GRAZ

Graz, Austria

Founded in 1585, the University of Graz is Austria's second-largest, and one of its most innovative, universities. With around 30,000 students across six faculties, it focuses on addressing societal challenges through education and research. The university offers a wide range of programmes, including Philosophy, History, and Arts, fostering critical thinking, expertise, and social skills. The Faculty of Humanities encourages students to explore various disciplines and pursue academic and professional goals.

Located in the vibrant city of Graz, the university benefits from its cultural and social atmosphere. Graz, Austria's secondlargest university city, features a UNESCO World Heritage Site historic center, outdoor activities, and a lively social scene. Known as Austria's most bike-friendly city, Graz is perfect for students seeking both academic and extracurricular opportunities.

Language Requirements for Admission (CEFR Framework): English B2, German B2 *N.B. Students wanting to study only in English, must first check whether they can find enough English-taught courses to fulfil their home university's credit requirements.*

Language Certificate Requirements: Students must either upload an official language certificate OR download the template provided in Mobility-Online and have it completed / signed by the home university.

Internship Available on Request: Yes, students must apply via Erasmus+ SMT but cannot complete a study exchange (Erasmus+ SMS) at the same time.

Research Project Available on Request: Yes, but this is dependent on the topic, the project and the availability of the supervisor. Approval must be sought by the exchange office before arrival.

UNIVERSITY OF SALAMANC

Salamanca, Spain

Founded in 1218, the University of Salamanca (USAL) is one of the three oldest universities in Europe. It offers a wide range of faculties and research institutes in the sciences and arts, positioning it as a leading institution in Spain, Europe, and globally.

The university provides a conducive academic and research environment for nearly 26,000 students annually (both undergraduate and postgraduate) and more than 3,000 researchers, who are distributed across 64 university departments, 16 faculties and schools, 10 university schools, 12 institutes, and various research units covering social, biomedical, arts, experimental, and formal sciences. The University of Salamanca consistently ranks among the top Spanish universities in both national and international assessments.

UNIVERSITY OF SIENA

Siena, Italy

Founded in 1240, the University of Siena is Italy's second oldest university, with a rich history and a strong tradition of teaching, research, and innovation. Over its eight centuries of existence, it has produced significant knowledge across all academic fields, becoming one of Italy's leading institutions in research, education, and services.

Today, the University of Siena is a globally recognised institution, actively fostering internationalisation through dual degree programmes, increased student mobility, and participation in key international higher education networks. Despite being a mediumsized university, it welcomes over 550 international exchange students annually and hosts more than 400 international students in its summer programmes, contributing to the university's global presence and positively impacting the local community and surrounding areas.

UNIVERSITY OF TURKU

Turku, Finland

Turku is a historic university town, which first saw the Royal Academy of Turku established in 1640 by Queen Christina of Sweden. Following Finland's independence in 1917, a campaign led to the founding of the University of Turku in 1920, initially comprising the Faculty of Humanities and the Faculty of Mathematics and Natural Sciences.

The Faculty of Humanities, the oldest at the university, focuses on multidisciplinary education and societal development. It includes two schools: the School of History, Culture and Arts Studies and the School of Languages and Translation Studies, offering various Bachelor's and Master's programs. ELAN students can take courses in culture, arts, and languages, including Finnish, French, German, Spanish, Italian, and English. They must choose at least 50% of their courses from the Faculty of Humanities while also considering options from the Faculty of Social Sciences for a broader educational experience.

ELAN CERTIFICATE



VALUE

The ELAN certificate is the primary means through which the Network promotes the

principles of a Liberal Arts education. It complements students' academic transcripts, highlighting their versatility, initiative, and social responsibility, while enhancing their career prospects.

Students should inform the ELAN coordinator at their home institution as they complete individual requirements. Once all criteria are met, the ELAN Network will issue the certificate.

OVERVIEW

Requirements can be fulfilled at the home or ELAN partner university. Activities may count towards both the certificate and the student's degree programme (e.g., the ELAN project may also count towards a dissertation), unless otherwise specified. The ELAN board may accept ECTS equivalents where appropriate. PhD students are also eligible for the ELAN certificate.

All requirements must be approved by the home university coordinator and align with the liberal arts approach.

ELAN CERTIFICATE REQUIREMENTS

Compulsory (ALL must be completed):

- 1. An ELAN mobility approved by both the home and host university (monitored via the learning agreement), with a minimum of 15 ECTS required for Bachelor and Masters students.
- Study of or in a **foreign language**, which can be combined with the study of the culture related to that language. 2. Minimum of 5 ECTS.
- 3. Liberal Arts Project Students are encouraged to take an interdisciplinary approach and explore the relevance of the arts and humanities in a contemporary context. They should consult their home coordinator on length and assessment criteria for the project.
- Final Reflection Paper (700 1000 words) Students should reflect on how their ELAN mobility contributed to 4. their academic and personal goals. The paper must be submitted to the home ELAN coordinator no later than one month after the mobility ends.

Optional (students must select AT LEAST two):

- Study of or in a second foreign language, which can be combined with the study of the culture related to that 5. language. Minimum of 5 ECTS.
- 6. Internship or placement approved by the ELAN home university coordinator for a minimum period of one week.
- Participation in an Intensive Study Programme or Summer School approved by the home ELAN coordinator. 7.
- Participation in a MOOC or other type of online course approved by the home ELAN university coordinator. 8.
- Participation in, attendance at, or assistance with an academic conference related to liberal arts, approved by 9. the home ELAN university coordinator.
- 10. Participation in a group project on an interdisciplinary topic and/or one that considers the relevance of the arts and humanities in the contemporary world (minimum of 5 ECTS). Students must achieve a mark of at least Category 2 according to the ELAN Grade Conversion table - see the ELAN webpages for more information.
- 11. Students may suggest additional forms of extracurricular activity to the home ELAN coordinator for approval. For example, participation or work in:
 - Inter-university programmes 0
